

ACS Style Guide

as approved 25 November 2017, with additions or changes from the 2011 version underlined.

General guidelines

1. This is a Style Guide, and not a set of unbreakable rules. Its main purpose is to steer authors and editors towards a more consistent approach in all our publications, and to provide guidance on particular usages. Within any individual publication, consistency of approach is paramount.

This Guide does not seek to dictate rules on general, non-cricketing, issues, e.g. where two different spellings of the same word are in common currency (e.g. judg(e)ment, recognise/ize, gaol/jail, etc). Again, consistency of approach within any single publication is paramount.

2. Style for setting paragraphs: All paragraphs should be full out left and justified, with a line space between each paragraph.

In text, long quotes, say over four lines, should be inset, with a line space before each inset.

3. Dashes, brackets, parentheses, and ellipses:

En-dashes (rather than hyphens or the longer em-dashes) should be used at the start and end of the phrase or clause involved, with a space before and after each dash.

Square brackets should be used only for editorial-type interventions, such as where a linking word is required in mid-quotation to insert words not used by the speaker.

Typographical ellipses [...], rather than dot-dash-dot-dash-dot-dash (from six key strokes of the keyboard) should be used, with a space before and after the ellipsis.

4. Plural entities (board, committee, side, team, ECB, ICC, MCC) – use singular verb or pronoun if the entity is being referred to as a unit ('the ECB is ...', 'the committee is ...'), but if the members of the group are being thought of as individuals a plural verb or pronoun is appropriate. An exception is made for the names of cricket teams: "England are 200 runs ahead" rather than "England is ...".

5. Initials – use MJK Smith (no points, but with space before surname).

Smith, MJK can be used in alphabetical tables.

Names such as Garfield St Aubrun Sobers and Everton de Courcy Weekes – use GS Sobers (not GStA) and ED Weekes (not EdeC)

6. Full points in abbreviations: No points for abbreviations like Dr, Mr, Rev, Capt, MCC, ICC, ECB, NSW, lbw etc.

Use i.e. and e.g. rather than ie and eg

7. Numbers – spell out up to and including ten; then figures, except for bonus points in Championship matches, 6ft 2in etc, and in scores (see point 8 below).

But NB eleven, twelfth, twenties, thirties, fifty, hundred etc can be used as words as a generic description. Numbers can be spelled out in headings and at the start of a sentence.

Thousands – 1,000, 11,000 etc in text; but 1000, 11000 etc in tables and scorecards to help alignment, and in giving team or individual scores in text (thus Victoria scored 1107, not 1,107).

Ordinals – do not use superscript (i.e. 18th not 18th).

£3.2m (or £3.2 million if it needs to be made very clear), £3.2bn

8. Scores: 238 for six dec (without point) in text; 238-6 dec in scores.

Bowlers: six for 14 in text; 6/14 in scores.

Results: Lancashire won by nine wickets, but Lancashire won by 9 runs (i.e. spell out number for wickets, use digit for runs.)

Retirements: In the first innings Bell, when 0, retired hurt at 1/0 and resumed at 279-5.

Points: 0pts, 1pt, 24pts.

9. Dates: 17 April 2010; 17, 18, 19 April. (i.e. comma only between dates, not within a single day). With weekday, Thursday 19 April 2010 (no commas). In giving match dates on scorecards, use square brackets to indicate a scheduled day on which no play took place: 17, [18], 19 April.

Short dates (for births/deaths) 17.4.1999

10. Overseas seasons: 1997/98 (NB 1999/00 not 1999/2000).

Decades: 1980s. Short form: 80s (not '80s).

Centuries: the 18th century, the 21st century (but 18th-century cricket, 21st-century cricket – see 21 below on adjectival use). No superscript i.e. 18th not 18th.

11. Batting places: Any of the following is acceptable, provided that consistency is maintained: No. 3, no. 3, number 3

12. Hours and minutes: Follow rules as above on numbers, unless specified otherwise in copy. No comma between hours and minutes. Also 'an hour and three quarters'.

13. Time of day: 2.30 pm (space between figures and letters).

14. Quote marks – single. Use double for "quote within a quote".

15. England A not England 'A'. List A not List 'A'.

16. % not per cent.

17. The use of extra 's' in possessives after names ending in s is a matter for editors' discretion: Simmons' or Simmons's, James' or James's. But note that the accepted spelling of some place names requires the extra 's' (e.g. the area of St James's in London). If in any doubt, check!

18. Cap after hyphen in running heads and headings (First-Class, One-Day).

19. * and † for captain and keeper (respectively) in scorecards and in team sheets.

20. Australia for Test/ODI/T20I side, Australians for touring side outside internationals (etc); rare exceptions such as All-India may be negotiated.

England XI for the England touring team outside international fixtures (after they stopped being MCC).

Country names may sometimes be used for non-Test sides, e.g. Ceylon, in a fixture which is not a full international.

Where the distinction is needed, use 'a South Africa spinner' [etc] to indicate one who plays for the national side, and 'a South African spinner' to indicate one who comes from South Africa but who plays for another side: thus Maharaj and Imran Tahir are 'South Africa spinners', but Prior and Watling are 'South African keepers'. [NB the qualification 'Where the distinction is needed'.]

21. Hyphens: the 18th century (noun) has no hyphens, but 18th-century (adjective) cricket does.

Similarly, with complex nouns (e.g. asking rate, extra cover, leg break, off side, off spin, run out, short leg) we should as a general principle use two words with a space between them, except where there is a substantial tradition of using hyphens (e.g. double-century, follow-on, half-century, hat-trick).

Where such nouns are turned into adjectival phrases, we should generally use hyphens, e.g. a leg-break bowler bowls leg breaks. Note too that the bowler concerned is a leg-spinner (with a hyphen).

Avoiding ambiguity is a primary consideration, e.g. first-rate collector rather than first rate collector.

See also point 28 below.

22. In text, the titles of books, newspapers, almanacks and magazines should be in italics, as should ship names, including 'HMS', 'SS' and similar, and perhaps pubs.

Italics and accents can be used in the less familiar non-English words, but are not necessary for familiar ones.
23. Note that the *Daily Mail* and the *Mail on Sunday* have no initial capital for their definite article, but *The Times*, *The Guardian* and *The Daily Telegraph* all do.
24. Single (not double or triple) space at the end of every sentence in text.
25. Second Eleven (for specific team), second eleven (generic), Second XI (in scorecards).
26. Place names: Be cautious about the use of 'new' names of towns, cities, provinces, etc: stick with the old name until it is clear that the new one has superseded the old one in common use, or is used at least as often as the old name. In India, Mumbai, Kolkata and Chennai have now superseded Bombay, Calcutta and Madras respectively, and should be used when those cities are being referred to in a contemporary context. For others where the new name is less commonly used (e.g. Bangalore/Bengaluru), the old name should be preferred, for the time being at least.

Subject to the above, use the name current at the time of the incident described – thus 'Harare' and 'Kwekwe' were 'Salisbury' and 'Que Que' in Smithy's time. Some care may be needed in working out when name changes occurred.

In a list, a batsman may thus score centuries in both Mumbai and Bombay.
27. In bibliographies, the following general formats should be used:

28. Field placings and batting strokes. The preferred style is for all field-placings, and all batting strokes, to omit any hyphens: thus cover point and not cover-point, on drive and not on-drive. An exception is made for the fielding position 'bat-pad', where the hyphen is considered more natural. Note that the hyphen is required when any of these terms is used adjectivally: the cover-point fielder, etc.
29. Currencies: When referring to dollar currencies, where necessary for clarity the 'nationality' of the dollar should be written out in full the first time that the currency is referred to, and may thereafter be abbreviated ("Steve Smith's match fee is 150 Australian dollars, while other members of the team only receive \$AUS100". Use \$AUS, \$CAN, \$NZ, \$US as the abbreviations; note that there should be no space between the abbreviation and the following numerals: thus \$AUS100, not \$AUS 100.

In India, large figures, especially when referring to money, are often expressed in lakhs and crores [of rupees]. 1 lakh = 100,000; 1 crore = 100 lakhs = 10 million. If using these terms (e.g. in a quotation), they should also always be 'translated' into more familiar numbers, e.g. 'Tendulkar's annual income was 20 crores [200 million rupees].'
30. Ground names In scorecards, the contemporary names of grounds (including any sponsor's name) should always be given. This is not necessary in text, except where a ground name has changed altogether (e.g. Lancaster Park to Jade Stadium); in such cases, if necessary to aid identification, the former or best-known name of the ground should be given in brackets. When referring to the ground over a period of time during which the name has changed, the original or best-known name should be used: 'Stoneman's 370 not out in 2018 was the highest score ever made at The Oval'.

County team abbreviations

In text, as a general rule, we should spell out the full names of teams. Some abbreviation may be acceptable in tables to avoid entries extending to two lines.

Note that no apostrophe is routinely needed for possessives after abbreviations that end in 's' : Chris Read was the Notts captain, not the Notts' captain.
